Make & Take

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A great way to communicate with your child/client is through the use of visual supports. Even if the child can communicate with words, there may be anxiety-provoking situations where the use of pictures can help them express their wants and needs appropriately. Visual supports may also be used to assist individuals in completing multi-step tasks and making transitions. We strongly encourage you to try these strategies in the home, classroom, therapy sessions, and community!

The pictures used in today's session are from **Silver Lining Multimedia**. Other visual support programs are listed below, however you can make your own visual supports by taking pictures with a camera. Some children respond better to familiar pictures, as they may not have the skills to generalize objects and concepts (i.e. they may need a picture of their own car instead of the picture of the van that we have on our cards).
